# TO HELP EMBRACE TECHNOLOGY


Our Home & Community Services team offer a range of new online programs to help seniors improve their confidence with technology.

It's not unusual to be a little stumped when it comes to technology. Especially recently with COVID-19 and the use of QR Codes everywhere you go.

Catholic Healthcare's new online *Smart Technology* program for Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP) clients helps seniors improve their digital confidence and use of technology in small, safe online groups.

The *Smart Technology* program is run in partnership with *Your Link*, an organisation that runs educational courses for seniors.

In the eight-week program, seniors will learn how to download apps, use QR codes to register at venues, and how to connect with family and friends using video calls, messaging and emails. There are four courses that cover both Apple and Android devices. Not to be missed.





# HEALTH AND WELLNESS PROGRAMS

Meditation classes and brain-busting trivia games help clients stay active, safe and healthy.

The Northern Sydney Allied Health team recently moved many of their health sessions online so that clients could attend their regular exercise and activities.

- Recommending equipment or strategies to improve safety.

# BURIED in treasures

### Managing our home and possessions as we age can be overwhelming.

That was the case for Trish, who found her living conditions had deteriorated.

"The big issue was my bedroom. It was full of clutter. I had piles of bed linen, towels, clothing, cushions and pillows. I couldn't use the room."

Trish's situation turned around after completing Catholic Healthcare's Buried in Treasures program in 2020.

"The course really helped me. I was feeling very insecure and had collected items and clutter in my home. During the course, I realised I was barricading myself in my own home."

New participants can join our future Buried in *Treasures* programs.

The 15-week online course supports people who accumulate excessive items. It is aimed at people aged over 65, and over 50, who who are at risk of homelessness. It's open to those who are eligible for the NSW Government's Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP).



The course is based on the successful self-help book Buried in Treasures: Help for Compulsive Acquiring, Saving, and Hoarding written by Dr Randy Frost, Dr David Tolin and Dr Gail Steketee, world-leading experts in the study and treatment of hoarding disorder.

Buried in Treasures topics include:

- · Understanding hoarding and why people collect.
- Motivation and confidence to start organising clutter.
- Practical skills and strategies to decide which items to save, and resisting the temptation to collect more.
- Overcoming feelings of anxiety and/or depression.

Participants engage in online learning sessions with a Catholic Healthcare facilitator in small groups of 12, meeting for two hours, one day a week. Run by Catholic Healthcare's Hoarding and Squalor team, the program is free and occurs every six months.

She worked tirelessly to support the Orana region providing dementia counselling, advice, support and advocacy services. Among her many achievements is the establishment of the Home Club for people living with dementia.

Kath grew up in Sydney. She worked as a nurse at the Royal North Shore Hospital in St Leonards before a 'tree change' saw her move to Coonamble in the 1970s. She settled, married and worked as a community nurse at the Coonamble Hospital for many years.

In 1993, Kath and her family relocated to Dubbo. She worked at Lourdes Hospital in the Aged Care Assessment Team (ACAT) and it was here where her journey in the field of dementia and dementia counselling began, as a dementia counsellor with Dementia Counselling Services. She was one of five counsellors working for Alzheimer's Australia for their National Dementia Action Plan.

"As a counsellor you work for both clients and their carers. You need to be able to assist both in navigating the assessment, diagnosis and care," she says.

### A 'TRUE GEM'

Kath has always been passionate about her work. She believes in best practice care and quality of life for clients. This fuelled her daily motivation and is the reason for her long career in the industry.

"Advocating best practice care and the best quality of life possible for clients and their carers helps clients retain their dignity and self-esteem. This is my aim, and it's what drives me," she says.

"I also just love working with all kinds of people listening to their experiences, life stories and wisdom, and what they have contributed to society."

Kath has handed over the baton to Anne and Jeanie, who will job-share the role of dementia counsellor. Both are experienced former community nurses.

### HONOURING OUR ORIGINS

#### **DR PETER STEANE**

### We honour the role of women who continue to shape Catholic Healthcare today.

It's not a coincidence or a happy stroke of luck that today our CEO is a woman and that half the members of our Leadership Team are women, or that women are valued across our workforce.

In fact, it's only because of the hard work and compassion of women, that Catholic Healthcare came into being at all, and it's a role that is often not sufficiently recognised.

The story has its origins at the very beginning of nursing. In the 1850s, four Sisters of Mercy, founded by Catherine McAuley, travelled from Dublin to help Florence Nightingale treat the wounded in the Crimean War. It was an event that marked the beginning of caring as a recognised occupation, as well as the leading role of women in providing health and healing in the burgeoning professional healthcare system.

Similarly, it was the Sisters of Charity that first brought pastoral care to the new colony in Sydney. In 1839, Mary Aikenhead founded the Sisters of Charity. They were innovators in every sense, helping female convicts in Parramatta, visiting hospitals and orphanages and setting up a school.

In modern times the Sisters established ministries for the marginalised and vulnerable in inner Sydney; helping those living with HIV, mental illness, drug addiction and poverty.

Perhaps most famously, they also supported the establishment of Australia's first medically supervised injecting room in Kings Cross in 2001. It was highly controversial but also very much needed by the community and to save lives.



-ADIES COMMUNITY AGED CARE

In 1994, Catholic Healthcare was founded to respond to the changing needs in aged and community services. Our founding congregations witnessed and served at the veritable front line, always open to new ways, new methods and innovative responses to real pastoral needs.

Five of those founding congregations were religious women.

It is pastoral innovation that is both pragmatic and gospel-based, that still influences us in Catholic Healthcare today. It has become part of our story and part of who we are.

Like a parent instilling values into the next generation, we have been stamped with DNA that defines who we are and what we do. What it gives to us is the ability to face the future with clear confidence and purpose.

It was the consistent actions of our founders that bestow the clear, unequivocal theme captured in our mission to promote life in all its fullness. These are the words of Jesus spoken in the Gospel of John (10:10). They remain our 'true north' in our metaphorical compass for our future.

It is a wonderful foundation to be reminded of, and it explains so much about why Catholic Healthcare still extols the values of compassion, respect, honesty, hospitality and excellence.

The men and women – but mainly women – who gifted us with the continuation of their ministries, were clearly focused on the gospel. But their mission is now our mission. The Catholic Healthcare story exhibits the values framed by our foundation and the gospel.

### LIVING WELL, DYING WELL



**NISHI RANI** featured in the *Living Well, Dying Well* Webinar

In 2019, the Archbishop of Sydney, His Grace Anthony Fisher OP, expressed concern about providing the most appropriate support for those people with life-limiting illnesses.

His Grace requested an investigation into how the Catholic Church could address this issue, and the rising need for community palliative care. The result is *Living Well, Dying Well*, a collaboration of Catholic agencies including Catholic Healthcare.

A webinar was held in October to raise awareness of *Living Well, Dying Well.* It featured Regional Manager of Residential Care Nishi Rana, who shared her expertise in palliative care and in supporting people in end of life (EOL).

She also discussed the vital role of volunteers (support workers, pastoral carers, recreational activities workers and grief support) assisting staff in creating a team-based approach to care.


